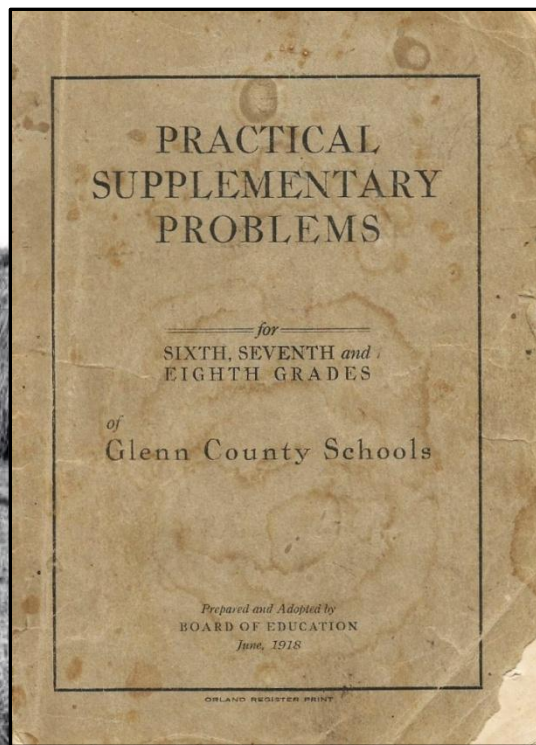

During a rainfall amounting to an inch, how many gallons of water will fall upon a garden which is 60 feet long and 40 feet wide?

When a bushel of wheat (60 pounds) sells for \$1.00, what is the price per cental?

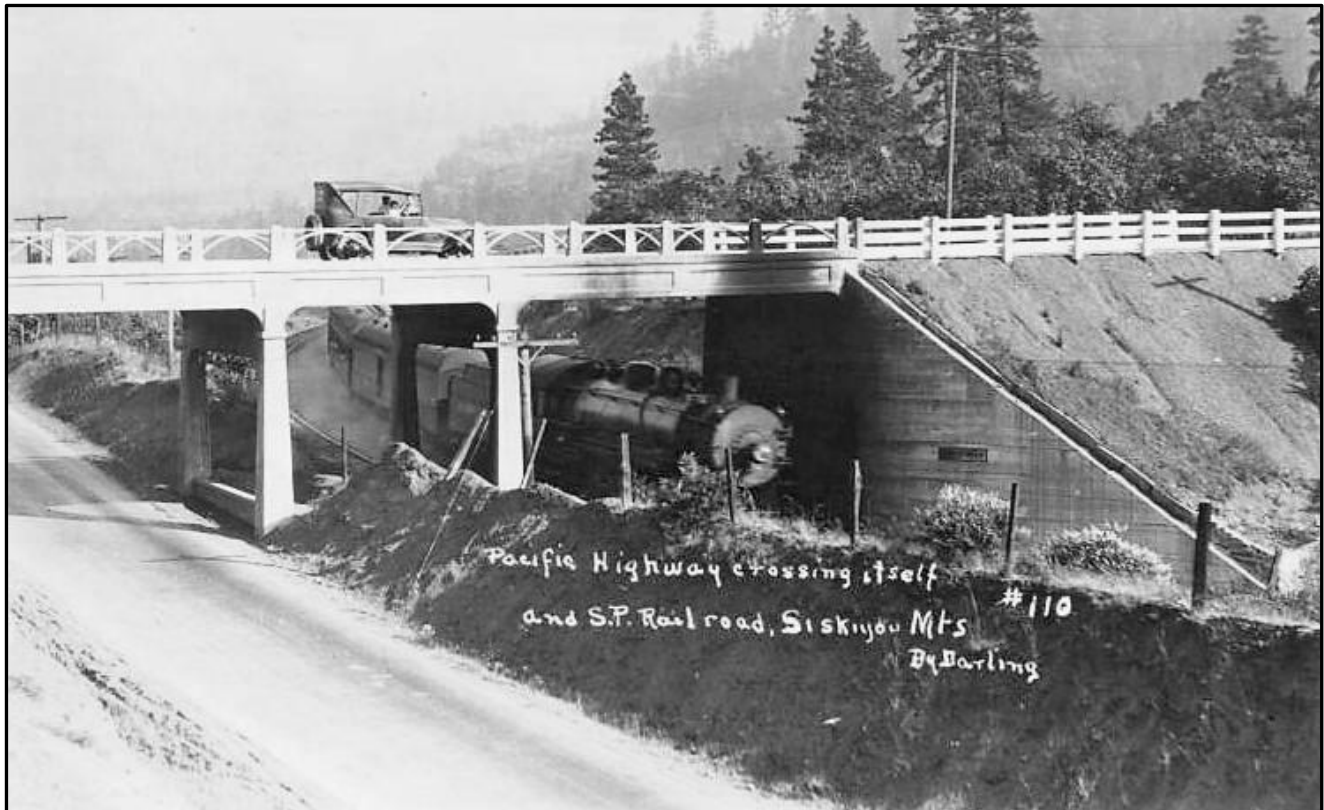

At 25¢ each what will be the cost of posts to fence a farm 450 rods long and 330 rods wide, the posts being set $24\frac{3}{4}$ feet apart?

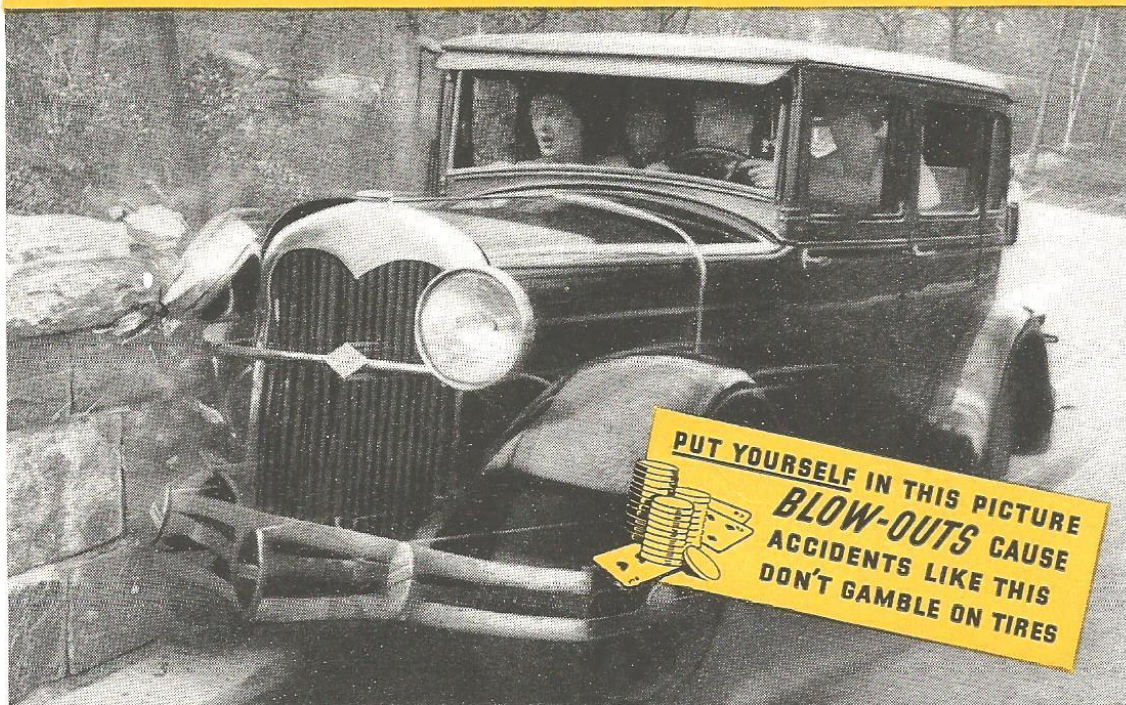

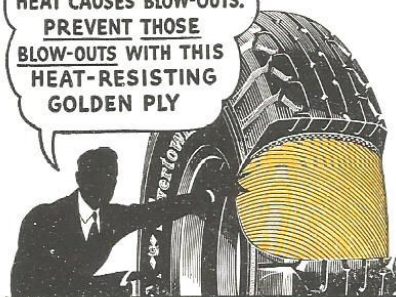
